Summary:	Would require each county office of education (COE) that provides educational services through a juvenile court school to students who are foster children to receive a specified allowance. The allowance would be equal to the amount the COE expended on foster children in 2005-06 adjusted by the cost of living adjustment (COLA) received by the COE for all categorical education programs in the prior fiscal year. In addition, COEs that provide educational services to students who are foster children transferring to a district from a juvenile detention hall, probation camp, or other similar facility and have received educational services through a juvenile court school shall receive an amount equal to the allowance described above for a period of one year after the student's enrollment .
